Media Release for the week of October 9th- October 15th

October 9th- Members of the Weyburn Police Service were called to a residence regarding an intoxicated individual who was no longer wanted in the home. The male had left the house upon police arrival, though the individual was located a short distance away. The male was given a ride to his own residence, no charges were laid.

October 11th – The Weyburn Police received a call of a missing adult who has medical issues. An investigation was initiated with Police conducted numerous checks within the City. Approximately 4 hours later police received a call the individual had been located. The incident remains under investigation.

October 11th – The Weyburn Police Service received a fraud complaint after a local business had mailed a cheque to a client, but the cheque had been altered and redirected to another company. The incident remains under investigation.

October 11th – Members of the Weyburn Police Service were dispatched to a downtown apartment building for a dispute between two residents. The involved parties were separated and the situation mediated with no charges being laid.

October 13th – Police were called to a break and enter of a garage, after the owners noticed tools missing. It appears entrance had been gained through an unlocked door and a quantity of tools and tool boxes were stolen. The investigation into this incident continues.

October 14th – Members of CTSS (Combined Traffic Services Saskatchewan), which consist of members of the RCMP, Estevan and Weyburn Police Services, conducted a traffic initiative focusing on combating impaired driving in and around Weyburn. During the evening the CTSS members conducted numerous vehicle checks. During the course of the evening one male driver was stopped and charged with impaired drive and drive while over .08. He was subsequently released to appear in court at a later date. Also during the evening a vehicle was stopped and during the investigation the male driver grabbed his driver's license and drove away at a high speed. Police pursued the vehicle for a short time before it was terminated for public safety reasons.

October 15th – A member to the CTSS conducted a traffic stop and found a 29 year old female who was displaying signs of impairment by alcohol. The subsequent investigation resulted in a 72 hour driver license suspension.

October 15th – The suspect driver of the vehicle which had fled from the police check stop during the evening of October 14th turned himself into the Weyburn Police. The 24 year old male was subsequently charged with evade, dangerous driving and assaulting a police officer. He was later released from custody and will be appearing in court at a later date
